The amount of vehicle crime over the past three months has remained relatively steady, although did increase slightly in August. There has been 4 arrests in relation to the Theft from Motors vehicles and enquiries are ongoing. There had been a number of issues in recent weeks including on 27 May when Section 27 notices issued by Police to young people who did not live in Spondon. Over the last few months we have seen a general drop in calls for service for Park Road. We have been conducting focussed patrols in this area, and positively dealing with incidents of antisocial behaviour, completing ASB referrals where appropriate. Also with the continuance of Operation Selset, we have utilised further police resources to target areas of ASB, including Park Road, which may have also reduced calls for serviceMobile CCTV camera in place on Church Street looking down park Road. Consultation on planning application for two houses in the Homestead grounds now finished. Decision likely to be made on 22 September at Planning Control Committee – or maybe 20 October. As to the issues arising with the wall, the principle concern was safety particularly to highway users from dangers posed by the original state of the wall and as a consequence of the state of the land and wall following the removal of the upper part of the wall. This was a particular concern given the narrowness of the footpath at certain points and the amount of traffic that passes this point. That has now finally been resolved and the highways officers and structural officers appear satisfied in terms of public safety and accordingly the barriers we erected along the footpath have now been removed. What are the Spondon Councillors going to do to stop Birds lorry going on pavement by the paper shop, making dangerous for pedestrians has they drive on and off the pavement? | Councillor Poulter reported that this has been a long standing issue and the resolution needs to balance different needs. The delivery lorry cannot fit into the loading bay. Over many years the parking of the lorry on the road caused vehicle tailbacks that impacted on buses, vehicles negotiating the lorry safely and bottlenecks at local junctions. Anti-Social Behaviour in General

During August the Spondon Safer Neighbourhood team made 6 referrals to the Anti Social Behaviour Team, in the last three months a total of 28 referrals were made.

During July the Spondon Safer Neighbourhood team made 17 referrals to the Anti Social Behaviour Team, A male appeared in court after abusing the two Spondon PCSOs, as a result of his court appearance he received a 12month conditional discharge and a fine. This shows that we take positive action when it comes to ASB and offenders will be punished by the courts if necessary.

The figures show a total of 76 crimes in Spondon area in August 2011 which is an increase of 31.0% on same period last year. Burglary Dwelling has been reduced from 5 to 2 compared to this time last year which is a reduction of 60.0%.

Over August Spondon has seen 32 of the crimes dealt with by way of positive outcome which equates to 42.1%. Last year the detection figures were at 58.6%.

During August During August a number of notable arrests have been made in Spondon.

4 males were arrested for theft from vehicle. 3 of these were arrested after a report was received of 3 males looking into vehicles in the early hours of the morning, the same night a vehicle was broken into and cash stolen from within. All 4 are on police bail pending further enquiries and forensic results. A male is currently on police bail after being arrested for breaking into a house and stealing several



Partnership Working - The Neighbourhood team organised for the alcohol intervention team – Addaction, to work in the community both at Youth Clubs and at ASB hotspots at peak antisocial behaviour times along with Police and PCSOs to interact with young people regards alcohol related issues, which are affecting Spondon, as part of operation Selset.

The interventions often act as an early way to highlight and reduce the dangers of alcohol abuse and to reduce instances of antisocial behaviour.

Help contribute to Derby's Core Strategy

- Are you interested in shaping the future development of the Spondon Neighbourhood and Derby?
- Do you have a view on how many new houses the city and neighbouring areas will need in the future and where these should be located?

The Core Strategy is the most important of the local plans the Council will produce as part of its Local Development Framework, or LDF, to create planning policy for Derby.

We now need to look at Derby's Housing needs as a whole. But, as we think it is unlikely that Derby will be able to meet all of its housing needs on its own, we need to work with adjoining local authorities to look at areas beyond the City's boundaries. This next phase of consultation will last **until 30 September 2011.** It will be asking two key questions:

- how many new homes does Derby need; and
- broadly speaking, where should these be located?

We have produced an information document and summary leaflets to help you think about these questions. There is also a Housing Growth Survey available for you to give your views. Some copies of the main documents will be available at the Spondon Neighbourhood Forum meeting on 14 September. The documents are available electronically upon request and to view on our web site at

Spondon Neighbourhood Board has a Highways, Greener, Cleaner and Planning sub group, which includes local residents who have volunteered their time to consider this issue. Spondon Neighbourhood Board consists of the three local ward councillors, local residents, and representatives from local community groups, businesses and public services such as Police, Derby Homes and Derbyshire Fire and Rescue Service. The board leads on behalf of the Spondon neighbourhood as a whole, and amongst other things aims to improve relationships between Spondon communities and public services, agree priorities for your neighbourhood, and influence decisions that reflect the views of local residents. It meets every three months to review actions against local priorities, find ways to tackle local issues and encourage local people to take part in decisions about their lives and communities. The Board priorities for 2011/12 are.

- 1. Improve highways and transport with a focus on reducing heavy goods vehicles, speeding, parking and safety around schools
- 2. Improve Community Engagement and Empowerment in Spondon with a focus on communications
- 3. Support a healthier community with a focus on inequalities and obesity
- 4. Improve community safety with a focus on antisocial behaviour, car crime and fear of crime

5. Improve the Environment in Spondon – with a focus on climate change, dog mess and litter The Board has identified its two Highways priorities for 2011/12 which are to:

- Complete investigations and tackle the traffic problems on the ASDA island.
 - > Improve parking and road safety at the Glendale Drive/Dale road junction.

Spondon Neighbourhood Board aims to:

- create a vision for Spondon neighbourhood
- set local priorities and plans
- encourage local people to take part in decisions about their lives and the Spondon community
- strengthen the role of the Spondon councillors as community leaders
- create better relationships between the Spondon community and public services
- support public services to work with the Spondon communities.

At Spondon Neighbourhood Forum, residents can:

Spondon Neighbourhood Board Update

- The Neighbourhood Board has agreed its priorities for 2011/12 and these are also used as the Community Budget funding criteria to:
 - Improve highways and transport reducing heavy goods vehicles, speeding, parking and safety around schools
 - Improve Community Engagement and Empowerment improving communications and engaging
 - > Support a healthier community with a focus on inequalities and obesity
 - Improve community safety with a focus on antisocial behaviour, car crime and fear of crime
 - improve the environment in Spondon . with a focus on climate change, dog mess and litter
- The Board makes recommendations for funding that is available from Section 106 funding. This is money available to be spent in Spondon which is provided by organisations and developers that receive planning approvals to mitigate their developments. The Board has made recommendations to use some section 106 funding to improve part of the Canal Towpath and to help address the conflict of Spondon Flyer buses meeting on Chapel Street.
- The Board has funded Sporting Futures to provide positive activities for young people in Spondon in 2011/12. They are providing sessions at Craddock Avenue Community Room with Youth Support and supporting a Youth Club at Springfield School.
- The Board aims to involve young people in its work and by having strong ties with Craddock Avenue and Stoney Lane Youth Clubs there are six Young Board members involved. These members support Spondon Youth Initiative which is one of the Board sub groups which aims to encourage more activities for young people.
- The Board funds up to 4 pages every month in C&C of Spondon to keep local people informed about local activities, local groups and the work of the Board and Spondon Forum.
- The Board is supporting a pilot initiative to set up Neighbourhood Justice Panels. The Board member volunteers have received their training and are now prepared for the new panels when they meet after 1 June 2011.



Spondon Neighbourhood Funding 2011/12

What's Happening in Spondon

Spondon Festival on 10/11 September

This years Spondon Festival, partly funded by Spondon Neighbourhood Board, is a family event at Bluebells Dairy on Locko Road. Organised by local community members for the whole Spondon community. It's over two days this year with plans to be bigger and better than last year. If you want more details go to their webpage <u>www.spondonvillagefestival.co.uk</u>.

Saturday 10th September, SpondonFest from 5pm will involve an evening of live outdoor music and entertainment alongside a fun fair and other attractions. Food and drink, including a bar, are also available. Free car parking Entrance to SpondonFest is £1 and free for under-11s.

Sunday 11th September 11am until 5pm sees the main Carnival Day, with entertainment, activities, competitions and stalls to suit all ages and interests. Free car parking, £1 Adults, free for under 16's. Bus shuttle service from Spondon Village.

A shuttle bus will also be running to take visitors from Spondon village to the event. Taxi firm A52 Cars will charge £3.50 for anyone travelling within Spondon to the festival.

Craddock Avenue/Arnhem Terrace Open Space

Derby City Council Housing Development Team has started conversations with Spondon Councillors, Parks Management Team and Riverside Housing Community Investment Team to assess options for the open space land between Craddock Avenue and Arnhem Terrace.

The Housing Development Team are driving the initial feasibility study for this area of land and discussions have identified one possible proposal to change the space into community allotments. It is early days and much more work is needed before any final conclusions can be agreed – this includes feedback from the local community.

To assess its feasibility for an alternative use the Housing Development Team are arranging for site investigations and soil sample tests to see if there is any contamination of the land since this will significantly impact on the possible uses and costs involved. It is likely to take around 2 months to commission the work and receive the soil test results which will be the key determinant of costs and feasibility. The production of landscape plans will run alongside this.

Discussions with Parks Management Team to assess their support to the project and the change of use for the space, have been positive and they have given their support and agreement in principle to progress the ideas subject to the options appraisal.

The Housing Development Team has received a commitment from Riverside to support the feasibility and options appraisal for the site. At this stage, it includes a commitment that their Community Investment Team will work with residents to progress options. Riverside has indicated that they would provide some capital expenditure but are unable to commit what level and what for until we have produced indicative costings for the proposals.

Once we have the results of the site investigations, soil test and landscape plans produced, Riverside has agreed to produce more detailed costings and at this stage we will review the proposal and its feasibility.

The Housing Development Team will progress discussions with local groups such as Spondon Horticultural Society/Nottingham Road Allotments to determine interest and ideas for managing the space should it be developed for allotments. Once we have confirmed the proposal is deliverable we will conduct more detailed community consultation. Further updates will be brought to the Neighbourhood Board and Forum

An introduction to Derby LINk



LINks are networks of local individuals, community groups, voluntary organisations and service providers to give local people a say in how local health and social care services are designed and delivered. We also have a remit to look into issues raised from service users. In Derby the LINk is hosted by Community Action Derby on Charnwood Street.

The Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 states that all health and social care providers must consult with their local LINk on any change to service delivery and involve service users in the design of services. LINk can make recommendations to those who run and plan health and social care services – for example, if a group of people raise the issue of how long it takes to get an appointment to see a GP or anything similar to this, LINk will assess that against scoring criteria to decide whether it should be taken further. This ensures that we only look at issues that have an impact on a wide range of people. And we can refer issues to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee at the City Council if action is not being taken.

Next year LINk will be changing into HealthWatch. HealthWatch will be very similar to LINk but will have greater influence and is designed to be the "local consumer voice for health and social care". Derby City Council will be responsible for putting Derby HealthWatch in place.

Anyone who lives, works or represents a group in Derby can become a member of LINk. We have developed different roles for people to get involved in LINk, allowing them to be as active as they want to be. These are Member, Committee Member, Researcher, Ambassador and Representative. We run training packages for all the above roles and we are always available for volunteers to talk to if they have any questions or issues that they want to raise. By becoming members of LINk you will have a direct connection to the service managers and commissioners responsible for the services you use.
